

THE WOMEN WHO CAME IN CHAINS

We owe them much, the many women who came in chains from the overcrowded prisons of England or from the stinking hulks of rotting ships lying in the Thames.

Times were hard and poverty was rife in England and so was petty crime. Stealing a few coppers to feed your children could find you charged as a criminal and sentenced to transportation. Below meet just one of our founding mothers!

Mary Reibey 1777-1855 (born Mary Haydock)

Transported as a convict Mary went on to become a very successful business woman. Born Mary Haydock in Bury, Lancashire in 1777. In August 1791 she was arrested for stealing a horse. She was all of 14 years old. Her punishment was transportation.

At the age of 16 Mary married Thomas Reibey in 1794 and bore him 7 children. Thomas was a junior officer with the East India Company and a good business man. He bought a boat and set up business with Singapore, trading grain, furs and skins. They had a very happy marriage and by the time Thomas died in 1811 they jointly owned several farms.

Mary took on the business and in 1812 she opened a warehouse in George Street, Sydney and in 1817 bought two more ships. She founded the Mary Reibey Institute and went on to launch several businesses in Sydney. In 1812 she became a founding member of the Bank of New South Wales.

She founded the Mary Reibey Institute which is proudly named after its founder and her portrait graces our Reserve Bank \$20 note.

Mary became a welcome guest in many fashionable homes in Sydney and a frequent visitor to the Governor's Lodge. In 1855 she was appointed Governor of the Free Grammar School.

There have been many books and plays written about Mary

The presentation followed the nibbles and was accompanied by a great deal of merriment. We toasted farewell to Pat and Richard and wished them all the best in their new home.


There was a good turnout at the event and all enjoyed themselves.




CELEBRITY WORDSEARCH
